A team of researchers from the Soviet and East European Division of PGM received the Marks Foundation Award for Creativity in Communication. The award was presented at a ceremony on April 23rd, by Director Charles Wick and Former Director Leonard Marks to the team for the work done studying Soviet perceptions of the U.S.
